IPSWICH YOUNGSTERS REIGN SUPREME

Ipswich youngsters, led by inspirational team captain Katherine Rednall, got the national indoor bowls championship off to an upbeat start when they won the David Cornwell Under 25 inter-club title for the first time, beating a team from the MidGlos club in Brockworth, 38-16, in the final.

"It's my favourite event," said 20-year-old student Rednall, "I first played in it when I was seven, and I can tell you it's got very happy memories for me. Winning it is like being in a dream - but we played like a real team, and I think we deserved to win."

The Gloucestershire side had beaten highly-rated teams from Torquay United and Swale on their way to the final, but made a stuttering start, and the Suffolk players were quick to take advantage, Martin Heitzman's rink racing into an early 13-1 lead.

Ben Coldrick's rink fought hard to bridge the gap, and had closed to 15-13 by the 16th end, but Rednall's rink, who were all square 6-6 with Nathan Kitchen's quartet after eight ends, pressed home to a 20-11 win, as Ipswich won by 12.

VETERANS DO BATTLE IN NOTTINGHAM

The finalists in this popular competition were on the green at Nottingham for sixteen hours over the two days of the Easter weekend - and the starting field of 64 players had been reduced to just eight when the final between The Parks (North Shields) and County Arts (Norwich) got underway this evening (SUN).

Only last week, last year's English champions - the Hounslow quartet of Dave Pitt, Lew Johnman, John Geeves and Ron Leleux - went on to win the British senior fours title in Llanelli, and this year's champions will represent England in the 2017 British championships in Belfast.

A Norwich County Arts four - Clive Derry, Malcolm Nicholson, Bryan Sadler and former England international Brian Taylor - needed an extra end to beat a quartet from the Adur club, skipped by John Godfrey, after the Sussex players led 7-5 after six ends, 12-9 after ten, and 20-18 after 20.

But Taylor conjured up a dramatic last-end double to tie things up at 20-20, and a sudden-death extra-end single saw the Norfolk team through to the quarter finals, where they swept past Ilminster, 24-8, before having to play another extra end against Maidenhead-based Desborough in the semi finals.

This time, Taylor struck well with both his bowls, turning an unpromising situation into a nail-biting 17-16 victory, setting up a final encounter with The Parks, who play in North Shields.

Geordies Roy Goldsmith, Mike London, Ian Brown and Brian Houghton, representing The Parks, got past Colchester and Blackpool Newton Hall on their way to the semi finals, where, after leading for more than three hours, they faced a match lie on the last end against David Warrington's Croydon.

Houghton managed to kill the end with his final delivery, and The Parks scored three shots on the replay for a 21-16 win.

Surrey is where indoor bowls started, the Crystal Palace club being formed in 1905 under the influence of the cricketing Doctor, W G Grace - but the county's bowling heritage counted for nothing in today's Over 60 intercounty final, in which Northamptonshire triumphed over Surrey, 130-118.

Northamptonshire's win gave them the title for the third time in the eight years since the event was first held in 2009, and at first it looked as if it might be a runaway victory, because the Midlanders raced into a 23-4 lead in only three ends across the green.

Surrey hit back, and at one stage reduced the deficit to just three shots - but Northants merely tightened their grip, and surged ahead once again. Another late rally saw Surrey get their noses in front at 117-115 - but Northants moved up a gear, scoring 15 shots to Surrey's one over the last ten ends.

Northants' team manager John Haines skipped his rink to a 21-13 win, while Tony Weston, Jim McKee and Walt Winsor steered their rinks to wins of six, four and two shots respectively, while Paul "The Greek" Vamvacopoulos and Steve Fortescue replied with narrow wins for Surrey.
